Springer Announces Capital Campaign

Springer School and Center, the leading resource for learning disabilities in the Greater Cincinnati area, recently announced a \$5,000,000 capital campaign, Imagine the Possibilities. More than halfway to the goal, the campaign has received a \$250,000 leadership gift from the Harold C. Schott Foundation and a \$250,000 challenge grant from the Farmer Family Foundation to stimulate community support. The Springer Board of Trustees has 100% participation in the campaign with a combined gift of \$550,000. Lead gifts from corporate funds and trusts include Cincinnati Bell; Jacob G. Schmidlapp Trusts, Fifth Third Bank, Trustee; The Procter & Gamble Fund; and Western & Southern Financial Fund. Campaign Chair,

Kate Lawrence in making the announcement said, "As a parent of two children with learning disabilities, it is an honor to chair this capital campaign. Springer can change children's lives and give families hope. All of these gifts have inspired us to continue to work towards our campaign goal. In doing so, we will be able to follow our mission which is to reach out to the ever increasing number of children who are affected by learning disabilities in our community."

Imagine the Possibilities has two components: preserving and improving the campus (\$1.2mil) and financial aid scholarships (\$3.8mil).

Springer's campus is in need of significant updating to sustain the quality program for which Springer is known and to be handicapped accessible. While the facilities are well maintained, they no longer support program needs. Within the existing structures, there are no unused spaces. Therefore, existing spaces will be redesigned to serve the multiple purposes pages of school and center programs.

A major key to Springer's success has always been the high level of specialized attention that each child receives, whether enrolled in the day school or center programs. The cost to provide that level of attention continues to rise. To continue to be accessible to all children regardless of their families' financial circumstances, *Imagine the Possibilities* will seek funding to bolster financial aid. The \$3.8 million for scholarships will be used to establish a special fund. The additional monies available from the fund will translate into 20 or more new scholarships on a yearly basis.



Celebrating at the Annual Dinner

Spring always brings a time for celebrating the year and looking to new beginnings at the Annual Board of Trustees Dinner, held this year on May 16. This special event honors outstanding Springer graduates, recognizes staff members for their commitment to the organization, and acknowledges retiring Board and Parent Association trustees for their work while welcoming new members for the coming year.

Recognition was given to two retiring trustees for their dedication to Springer. During his nine years as a trustee, Dick Meder served the Board in several capacities on the Development Committee, Education Committee, and the Committee on Trustees, acting as Chair for the Committee on Trustees in 2004-05 and 2005-06. Dick's most unique role, however, was being the first Springer graduate to serve on the Board of Trustees. Dick attended Springer in the early 70's, graduating in 1973. At the Annual Dinner, he spoke about how important the strategies were that he learned at Springer and how he still uses them today. Even though he is retiring from the Board, luckily for Springer, Dick will stay connected to the organization; in his own words, "I believe

Executive Director's Column SHELLY WEISBACHER, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

FOR THIRTY-FIVE YEARS, SPRINGER HAS empowered students with learning disabilities to lead successful lives. While much has changed since 1971, the core of what we do remains steadfast - we teach children the skills and strategies they will need to succeed in traditional school settings and beyond. And, since 1999 we have been reaching an ever-increasing number of people affected by learning disabilities through our center programs for educators, parents, and students.



Time and again the effectiveness of Springer is affirmed whether it be through the graduates' speeches delivered at commencement, the stories shared by the Outstanding Achievers, the alumni who spontaneously visit campus and send us notes of their accomplishments, or through the course evaluations completed by center participants.

Springer achieves its success by building a strong community within and establishing networks throughout the region to attract educators, parents and students to our programs.

The strength of the internal community is realized through our commitment to our values. Parents, teachers, staff and the children themselves partner closely to accomplish the outcomes we are seeking for each student. While it would be possible to focus just on the academics, we recognize the importance of fostering a true sense of belonging. Springer students speak candidly about the significance of being understood, accepted and appreciated. In turn, our students contribute to the strength of our community through their acts of kindness and the caring manner in which they respond to each other. Further, the students strengthen our community by helping in their classrooms or in the science lab, by volunteering for flag corps, by participating on student council and raising money for Springer and other worthy causes, or by serving as Springer ambassadors.

Word of mouth is the number one manner in which we establish our external network and link ourselves to the broader community as a regional resource. Parents of current and former students, staff, trustees, and the students themselves help others find their way to Springer. Diagnosticians, pediatricians, and therapists also spread the word and direct families to seek our services. Growth of the center's professional development classes has not only resulted in more families looking to Springer for answers, but also has led to more schools learning about our services and engaging us to provide programs for their

staffs. These networks are critical to ensuring that children get the help they need at the earliest possible point in their school career.

Achieving a strong community further depends on the support of our donors. People are often surprised to learn that many donors have no direct affiliation with Springer yet they contribute because they recognize the importance of having Springer's services available to our region. Our donors' generosity helps us to continue offering financial aid to one in four children attending the day school, and to grow the center's programs and maintain our information and referral services at no cost to the families. There is much to celebrate in the support we have received this year. Imagine the Possibilities, A Campaign for Springer is more than halfway to its goal; and collectively the annual fund drive and annual event generated more revenue than any year prior.

The poster pictured on this page appeared in the front stairwell just days before the school year came to a close. I could not have planned a more fitting display to underscore the importance of community, but was even more delighted when I learned that Erin, a student in the Intermediate level, had decided on her own to create this poster as a means to encourage others to do their part. There is no question that the strength of our community resides in the collective efforts of all - our children, parents, teachers, staff, trustees, and donors. My heartfelt thanks to each of you for all you do for Springer.

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
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Bolan Scholarship Awards

Fran Cohen was a keen observer of children, a skilled diagnostician, and an educator. For 16 years, she provided a nurturing classroom that celebrated all students. In the words of Executive Director, Shelly Weisbacher, "Fran has a gift for seeing the child first and their difficulties as the work that she and the child will undertake together — in thoughtfully considered, deliberate steps — ultimately achieving the established

goals." Visitors to Fran's class would likely see children sitting cross-legged in a circle around Fran in her rocking chair learning routines, sharing a book or simply enjoying each other's company at the end of a busy day. With Fran, it is always about the children. She holds each child accountable for their growth all the while demonstrating to them that they are respected, cared for and supported in their struggles. Fran also played a critical role in parent education, guiding parents as they attempted to sort out their understanding and feelings about having a child with a learning disability.

Over the years, she participated on key committees including math and writing curriculum committees, served on the Leadership Council and as the faculty representative on the Executive Director search committee, and acted as Team Leader for the Primary Department. When Fran suggested that something needed to be done she was always willing to take part in making sure it happened. After proposing that a parent information evening on ADHD be put together, she volunteered to serve on the presentation panel. She helped craft



new guidelines for the All School Quest and then took the responsibility to act as cochair during the first year of implementation. Throughout the years, Fran articulated various aspects of Springer's program at numerous presentations to the Board. Additionally, student teachers and practicum teachers benefited from her skill and wisdom while countless observers stood in the doorway watching her work calmly and diligently to uncover what lay beneath the surface of a child's struggles. Thanking Springer staff for her retirement gifts Fran said, "These are wonderful presents, but the best gift of all is Springer." Fran's calm, thoughtful manner, her approachability and her humanity has been a model for all of us. She leaves a rich legacy.

"Right hand ready!" is a phrase many will remember and associate with Janet Meyer, as she helped navigate the youngest of Springer's students down the stairwell. Students knew they could count on Mrs. Meyer, which at their tender age provided them with wonderful feelings of security. Janet's knowledge of Springer's reading and math techniques and her skill in meeting individual learning needs greatly assisted student learning. Her skills were in evidence daily as she worked to motivate even the most reluctant learner. Janet looked for ways to make learning "hands on" for students. Fran noted that Janet was "especially adept at creating meaningful memory aids for students", even spending time on weekends looking for an item which would enhance the students understanding of the topic being studied. Janet took an interest in every student and was invested in his or her progress. She provided encouragement at every turn. Janet also embraced additional responsibilities over the years supporting Writing Workshop, Science, Social Studies and Social Skills classes.

Janet had a true love for the children she taught. Whenever she was sharing something about a child, she always ended with "I love these kids!" Well, Mrs. Meyer, they loved you, too.





Center Is A Community Resource

IN RECENT YEARS, THE SPRINGER SCHOOL and Center's mission of empowering students with learning disabilities to lead successful lives has extended past the school's classrooms into the Greater Cincinnati/
Northern Kentucky community. Through the center's professional development training for teachers, parent education seminars, and student programs, many more children receive the strategic interventions necessary to succeed academically.

The center's creation was a direct outgrowth of a defined need to share best practice methodologies with those outside of the Springer school environment. Initially the intention was to invite students, parents and teachers to the Springer campus to develop a

The teachers could see the school classrooms in action, and parents could hear how to best work with their child who struggles academically. Students could take part, not only in the summer program; already in existence, but also a myriad of classes supporting a range of needs. This early vision established the framework for year-round programming conducted not only on Springer's campus but also off-site throughout the region.

In the weeks before the start of the school year, we are busy leading professional

development seminars. These programs continue throughout the year, supporting the content areas from kindergarten to high school. Our work with educators does not stop at the end of the school year. In June, teachers join us at the center for intensive, weeklong seminars. Our ultimate goal is to give teachers the tools necessary to become more diagnostic in working with the children whose lives they touch throughout their teaching careers.

A parallel branch of center services focuses on parent education. Parents want to understand their child as a learner, advocate for their child when academic challenges arise, and work with the school to accomplish academic success. Springer's parent classes are beneficial, giving parents insight, knowledge and the language to use when working on behalf of their child. Center staff is also available to help parents decipher individual learning difficulties and figure out steps to encourage learning success. The center has also become an access point for families who enroll in the school for intensive academic remediation. Parents, whose children are enrolled in the day school, access center classes to become better informed about language-based learning disabilities.

During the school year, students can take advantage of the after-school language arts program as well as a ten-week study skills class, social skills group and an SAT preparation class, which runs prior to each administration of the test. In the winter, a second study skills class is offered along with a handwriting improvement class. Summer brings the four-week morning program and afternoon programs that focus on improving writing, social cognition, basic math foundations, study skills and classes that access the imagination to improve organization of thoughts.

Springer has become a leading resource throughout the region. Our passion for empowering learning is contagious and will only increase as we meet the ever-growing need for information about learning disabilities.

The Arts at Springer

MUSIC AND ART CLASSES ARE A PART OF EVERY Springer student's weekly schedule. Additionally, students have the opportunity each year to explore different forms of art and music through instruction from local professionals thanks to the Norita Aplin Musician In Residence and the Maureen Wenker Artist In Residence programs.

This year's Musician In Residence program hosted Silver Arm, a Celtic music group consisting of four musicians who create beautiful ballads and lively Irish dance music along with Swedish, French and Romanian selections. Their sound has been described as a blend of traditional reels and jigs with modern, innovative arrangements.

In April, Anthony Becker and Yvonne Van Eijden came to Springer as featured Artists In Residence. Both artists do abstract paintings and sculptures and worked together with Springer students to create a sculpture of natural elements.
