

Director's Column Shelly Weisbacher

Springer's mission is to empower students with learning disabilities to lead successful lives.

We accomplish this by teaching students the strategies and skills they will need to succeed in traditional school settings; to understand their individual learning profile; and to be a selfadvocate.

The Outstanding Achiever Award recipients (profiled on page 4) exemplify attainment of our mission. These Springer graduates have experienced firsthand the success that comes from applying compensatory strategies, understanding their learning disabilities, and advocating for their needs throughout their educational careers. Ross Freshwater captures this well in a letter he sent to be read at the Annual Dinner. An excerpt from his letter follows:

"I cannot tell you exactly what Springer did to help me discover my learning potential. It is also hard for me to put into words exactly how my teachers helped me develop the tools that have made me so successful in life. I'd say that they were so good at what they were doing, that as a fourth and fifth grader I simply DID NOT notice how they were teaching me to learn. What I do know is the curriculum was challenging but reachable. Most important, I felt that the faculty truly respected and believed in my abilities as a learner and that somewhere out there in society, was a meaningful place for Ross Freshwater. You all can probably do a much better job of analyzing what it was about my time at Springer that allowed me my success. You are all living the Springer experience now - and no doubt can see, hear, and breathe the many wonderful things about the place that I blindly took for granted. What I will say is this - my two years here at Springer were among the best of my 17 years of school."

It is our goal that all graduates will take from Springer the belief they can achieve their personal dreams, as did Ross Freshwater...a belief based on their very real experiences of success while they were at Springer.

Outstanding Achievers Honored

Three Springer grads were honored for their achievements with the 2000 Outstanding Achiever Award at the school's Annual Dinner and Meeting, held on May 15th.

The Outstanding Achiever Award honors Springer graduates who have demonstrated success in their professions, academics, community service, art, and athletics.

This year's recipients were Ross Freshwater, Tom Holland, and Gretchen Langenderfer.

Ross Freshwater graduated from Springer in 1983. He then attended St. Xavier High School, Ohio University, and Ohio State University. Ross recently graduated from the Harvard Graduate School of Education, where he received a Master's in Education. On the way to earning his Master's Degree, Ross benefited from varied work experiences. He was instrumental in the success of a start-up global toy company specializing in educational products. Ross also managed a \$3 million dollar fund raising campaign for the United Way of Seattle, and served as a team leader for the National Civilian Community Corps in Denver, Colorado. Now that he is entering the world of teaching, Ross feels his experiences at Springer taught him how to "look at all students as people with parallel respect, and to draw on my own experience of not being the straight-A student."

Thomas Holland graduated from Springer in 1986 and Summit Country Day in 1995. He is a 2000 graduate of Mt. St. Joseph College with a Bachelor's Degree in Health

and Physical Education. He is currently working towards his certification and plans to become a teacher. While a Springer, Tom discovered athletic skills that would help boost his self-esteem and focus on academics. He later ran track and played football for Summit, where he holds several school records. While at Mt. St. Joseph, Tom maintained a 3.5 GPA while playing football and serving as co-captain during his senior year. Involvement in sports led Tom to a desire to coach, as well as teach. He has served his community as a junior high football and basketball coach, and hopes to continue to so do after he becomes a teacher. Tom thanked Springer for "boosting my self-esteem" and for showing him he could do well in sports and achieve academically.

Gretchen Langenderfer is a 1992 Springer Graduate. She attended Summit Country Day, and recently graduated from Muskingum College with a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology and Early Childhood. Gretchen will be attending the University of Cincinnati in the Fall to begin Graduate studies in Social Work. Gretchen has demonstrated great commitment to community service. She has served as a Peer Educator; answered crisis hotline calls for a counseling center; provided mentoring to incoming freshman at Muskingum; and volunteered for Circle K, area nursing homes, and a battered women's shelter. Gretchen also coordinated a service providing free tutoring to students in the Muskingum College area. In her acceptance speech, Gretchen thanked her family "for their support," and Springer for showing her she can succeed.



Take a Closer Look....at Art

In this issue of *News & Views*, we take a closer look at Springer's Art Program.

Corrinne Thaler has been with Springer for 23 years, and for the past five years she has served as Springer's Art Instructor.

As with all aspects of Springer's program, art instruction approaches each student's learning disability on an individual basis. Ms. Thaler uses a multi-sensory approach to teaching art. Presenting lessons visually, auditorally, and kinesthetically allows students to learn in whichever way works best for them. Furthermore, each project is broken down into steps to give students a better understanding of how it can be completed. Other issues, such as fine motor skills, organization, planning, and spacial awareness are also addressed during art classes.

The curriculum is flexible to allow for ageappropriate assignments. This means that while all students learn about the same artist or style, lessons and projects are adjusted to reflect each student's grade and skill level. Students are encouraged to achieve their potential, and to be proud of their work. "Many students with learning disabilities enjoy success in art, and because of that success, they develop self-confidence," states Ms. Thaler. "Students feel good about art, and about themselves."

Ms. Thaler was recently recognized for excellence in her field by the Robert Rauschenberg Foundation. Robert Rauschenberg is an abstract artist committed to learning disabilities issues. The Foundation is sponsored by The Lab School in Washington, D.C., a school specializing in learning disabilities. She was one of only

thirty art teachers from across the country selected to participate in a workshop entitled "The Power of Art: Teaching Students with Learning Disabilities." The workshop focused on teaching students with learning disabilities; ways of using art to teach academic skills; and developing curricula with other art instructors. part of the workshop, Ms. Thaler was presented with an award from Mr. Rauschenberg recognizing her achievement. She also received \$500 in materials to use in her classroom.

ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM

Through the generosity of the Maureen Wenker Fund, Springer was again able to host an Artist-In-Residence this past April. For two weeks, Debbie Brod worked with Springer Upper School students to make papier mâche masks.

Students were encouraged to create multi-media masks, using everything from newspapers to pipe cleaners. Each mask was truly a one-of-a-kind piece because students used their own faces as molds for their masks. Furthermore, all Springer students got involved by creating papier mâche vines and wreaths to complement the masks. At the gallery showing, students explained how the masks were made and described their creations for visitors.

Ms. Brod, a visual artist from Cincinnati, has served as an Artist-In-Residence for many schools in Ohio and was recently a featured artist at the University of Cincinnati Health Sciences Library.

Springer Center Provides Summer Learning

Springer Center is offering a variety of programs to accress children's summer academic needs. From strengthening skills in reading and language arts, to providing small group tutoring, these summer programs will broaden the services Springer Center provides to children in Greater Cincinnati.

The "Adventures in Summer Learning" program, currently in its seventh year, will be offered during the month of July. This half-day program provides instruction in reading and language arts, as well as math, computer, and "Challenge by Choice." Since 1992 "Adventures in Summer Learning" has been helping children entering grades 1-7 strengthen skills and improve self-esteem. The program has been so successful that it has grown to serve 64 children this summer.

Mini camps are a new addition to the summer program offerings. Designed at the recommendation of

current Springer parents, the camps will provide one hour of tutoring, plus two hours of enrichment activities. These classes will meet three times a week for two weeks.

We are also pleased to offer our successful handwriting program again this summer. Instructed by Springer motor therapist Amy Ford, these camps have helped children improve their handwriting through individualized small group instruction.
