Annual Fund Drive Underway

Under the leadership of Trustee Bradley Turner, the school's annual solicitation for support of its financial aid program is off to a very strong start. Mr. Turner, a relative newcomer to Cincinnati, is managing director of Gradison McDonald's Asset Management Fund. He is pleased to be associated with Springer because of his interest in educational programs and the school's fine reputation in the city.

Achieving the \$175,000 goal will assist families who would otherwise be unable to send their children to the school. This year, 50 children are receiving financial aid.

The Community Campaign seeks the support of individuals and businesses in the area through the avolvement of more than 30 volunteers. The volunteers include trustees, current and past parents and friends of the school. The Alumni Parents' Campaign is led this year by Rick and Debbie Blum, whose son is a Springer graduate. Dick Meder, the school's first graduate to be elected to the Board, is heading up the Graduates' Campaign. This campaign focuses on the idea of giving back so others can have the same chances they had. Buck Niehoff, chair of the Present Parents' Campaign, has offered two areas in need of support - financial aid or the library renovation project. The first-ever **Grandparents**' Campaign, chaired by John and Ruth Sawyer, also offers two options - financial aid or expansion of the science program. Contributions to

the Fund Drive are accepted throughout e year; the school's fiscal year ends on June 30.



Components of the curriculum are Language Arts, Math, Computer and Challenge by Choice. Each of these courses is designed to teach students strategies they can use in the coming school year.

Library Reopening: A Family Affair

We at Springer often make reference to the "Springer Family" when telling of special achievements, projects, or donations. We have been blessed time and time again with the devotion and generosity of parents, trustees, staff and friends who come forth when there is a need. The library renovation project is a wonderful example of our family spirit.

In her Spring letter to parents, Norita Aplin, then executive director, described the project and asked for input or suggestions. The "family" answered:

*Tim and Kathy Cassady, whose son Paul, was in his first year at Springer, stepped up. Tim, who is Barbara Cassady Frey's brother and a building contractor, not only offered to do the remodeling at cost, but to solicit supplies and materials at either no cost or at cost so the Board's money could go further. Kathy, an interior designer, prepared the drawings.

*Tom and Sherry Farnham, also Springer parents, owners of The Farnham Company, a business specializing in library furnishings, were closely involved in the selection and installation of the furnishings.

*As the start date drew close, Tim Cassady announced that the project foreman would be Dan Frey, Barbara's son and a Springer grad. Dan has worked with his uncle for several years while in college.

*About that time, John Frey, wanting to insure funding was adequate to complete the project, began sending letters to friends who had made memorial gifts to the school in Barbara's name. The response was wonderful!

*Several trustees opened doors to local charitable foundations resulting in grants to supplement the Board's funding.

On November 14, the "family" gathered at a reception to herald the reopening of the new and improved Barbara Cassady Frey Library. The atmosphere was definitely festive as more than 100 parents, children and grandchildren, trustees, funders and staff admired the changes and tested out the new computers.

In her tribute to all involved with the project, Springer's executive director, Shelly Weisbacher summed up the feelings of the guests that night and anyone who had watched the new space take shape when she said, "For many children with learning disabilities who have difficulty with the written word, a library can be a daunting place, but you have made this space inviting and comfortable."

In his comments, Paul Niklas shared a story about his search for an appropriate poem he could use to honor Barbara. He ended up at the the public library and approached a librarian describing the upcoming event. As luck would have it, librarian Donna Monnig's son Tom was a Springer grad! They selected a verse from Carl Sandberg that epitomizes Barbara's unwavering goal of doing as much as she could for the benefit of her children.

One of five children,
Barbara Cassady was born and
reared in Cincinnati. A
graduate of the Summit
Country Day School, she then
attended Marygrove College in
St. Louis where she majored in
speech and hearing.

Shortly after graduation in 1959, Barbara married John Frey and settled in Hyde Park. From that point on, the focus of

> her life was centered on her husband and family. She was the mother of nine children: John, Lynn, Michael, Jim, Tom, Katie, Dan, Anne and

Peter. Her two youngest sons, Dan and Peter, attended Springer. Barbara dearly loved her children and was dedicated to them. In spite of the huge task of raising nine kids, Barbara always found time to volunteer at her children's schools. At Springer, she was one of the founders of the school's library, soliciting books and materials, cataloging and acting as librarian several days a week so the students at Springer could have the experience of going to the library in their own school. Even during her treatment for lung cancer, she remained actively involved in her family's activities.

When she passed away in 1988, John asked that memorial gifts be sent to Springer's Library Fund. The library was formally named in Barbara's memory in October, 1988 when friends and family first gathered at the school to celebrate a remarkable woman and her spirit of love-filled giving.



Japanese Educator Visits The Springer School

Shusuke Shinohara was one of 24 Japanese teachers who visited Ohio this fall to learn about our educational system. While in Cincinnati, Mr. Shinohara was the houseguest of Springer faculty member Dr. Jill Johnson and her husband Bob Bonnici. A native of Betsukai, Japan, Mr. Shinohara holds a Bachelor's Degree in Education, and has taught first through third grades. During several visits to Springer, Mr. Shinohara met with various members of the Administration to better understand curricular issues, teaching methods, and how the school is structured and run. He also visited classrooms to talk about Japanese schools and students, as well as life in his hometown. Springer students had the chance to see a video of Mr. Shinohara's class, learn some Japanese character writing, get a demonstration of Kendo (a type of martial arts), and create origami hats out of newspaper. Although Mr. Shinohara saw many differences between Japanese and American schools, he found some things stay the same. "The children are very spirited," he said.


The proceeds from these activities benefit student programs like Girls' Club and field trip scholarships, as well as provide the school with educational items.

1994 Grad Named Golden Galaxy Winner

Having a learning disability will never prevent Kevin McLay from using his musical talents to serve others. In fact, it is his passion for music that has given him the confidence and motivation to keep trying and to reach out to others. Although he has a language based learning disability, Kevin learned to read music at an early age. His high school band instructor didn't even know he had a problem. As one of 11 winners chosen from 274 nominees from 49 area schools, Kevin exemplifies an active concern for humanity. The Golden Galaxy Award, sponsored by the Cincinnati Enquirer, WKRC-TV and the Cincinnati Youth Collaborative, honors high schools seniors who have used their talents to serve the community. Last summer, Kevin and members of his church taught songs in Portuguese and English to youth along the Amazon River. They spent eight days on a medical mission boat. Locally, he visits grade schools and nursing homes with his church chorus, plays trumpet in the Colerain High School marching band and Wind Ensemble and is active in the drama club. He spent last Spring Break helping with flood clean-up along the Ohio River. After graduation, Kevin plans to go to college, major in Music Education and become a band director.

1989 Grad Featured Commencement Speaker As a six year old, Erin Barrett could barely complete a sentence. As a 1997 Finneytown High School graduate, she delivered a flawless commencement address. The journey to the podium was filled with memories of taunts, years of tutors and therapists, hard work and a deep belief that you can accomplish what you really want. In a letter to Springer, Erin's mother wrote that she treasured the four years she spent at Springer because of "the wonderful start it gave her for learning." The end of Erin's speech clearly sums up the attitude we wish for all our students: "You have to work for your own happy endings. Life is never too easy. It is full of challenges you have to face on your own. Be strong. Believe in the beauty inside yourself." Erin is currently a freshman at Anderson University in Indiana with plans for a degree in elementary education.
