Director's Corner

With the help of an outstanding school staff, a resourceful and dedicated board of trustees, the many groups and individual friends of Springer School in the community, I look forward to the challenge and excitement of my first year as Executive Director of Springer Educational Foundation. Aware that I assume leadership of an established institution which has earned respect and preciation in our community, I see my challenge being to continue developing this wonderful program.

We began the 1985-86 school year with 117 students in eleven classrooms. There are new major undertakings in our program this year including a new science curriculum and the introduction of computers for classroom instruction specifically for written expression.

The new science laboratory equipment is a gift from the John S. Swift Charitable Trust in honor of W. G. Vollmer, Jr., grandfather of one of our 1985 graduates. Now our students will be learning scientific principles through increased laboratory work, along with their reading. This approach is ideal for our students. We begin our use of classroom computers with a focus on language arts for students who find written expression difficut. As we become familiar with the computers' potential, we expect to expand their uses in our classrooms. A grant from the Helen Steiner Rice Foundaiton has made our computer program possible.


The third undertaking focuses on composition and language arts. Much has been learned about expressing thoughts effectively. We will review and update our curriculum to include the latest knowledge about effective expression.

Annual Fund Drive in Progress


1985 Goal Is Set at \$90,000

New Direct Admissions Process

Is this child right for Springer? Is Springer right for this child? Affirmative answers to both of these questions are necessary, if Springer placement is to succeed.

Springer School has room for only a fraction of the students who could be helped by its specialized program. And, not every child who experiences difficulty in school needs the Springer program. To determine which youngster belongs at Springer, the admissions committee has established application procedures that include careful observation of the child's present school environment and scrutiny of test results that can indicate individual deficits and educational needs.

Corrinne Thaler, Director of Admissions, has interviewed and evaluated 64 prospective students and their parents during the 1984-85

school year. Of these, 17 were enrolled at Springer during that year and 34 entered this September. The admissions process is designed to facilitate placement of students exhibiting learning difficulties and to assure that Springer is the appropriate school to meet their needs. Corrinne meets with parents and students to help familiarize them with the school. A visit to the students current school, consultations with his teachers, and a review of testing results are all part of the process used to determine admission to Springer School.

The new direct admission procedures were developed when Springer, recognizing that diagnostic testing is now available to parents through other community and private sources, discontinued its diagnostic clinic in 1984. For children who are not

accepted into the Springer program, good school placements are recommended.

In addition, parents may call upon Nancy Ike, director of Springer's placement consultation services who helps parents from all over the country find appropriate placement in public or private day or boarding schools.
