Springer School and Center seeks to raise \$15 million for the growth and success of our mission. The three major initiatives include:

## **1** Financial Aid

Increased funding for our successful scholarship program.

### **2** Capital Construction

Increasing classroom space, adding Science and Technology labs, creating a new arts and multi-purpose auditorium, and center focused tutorial spaces.

### **3** Center Expansion

Expanding the Springer Center for community outreach and growing educational programming.

### COST PROJECTION

# \$15,000,000

Tuition, annual donations and restricted contributions provide funding for all operational expenses and current needs for the school and center.





**51%** of Springer families currently receive **financial aid**.

Annually, Springer has provided **more than** \$1 million in financial aid to families, and financial need has continued to rise.

This is why we need to secure Financial Aid and are asking for support to **grow the Financial Aid Fund**.

As the only school of its kind in the region, Springer admits children regardless of their family's financial ability to pay tuition.

This allows students in our region access to an education they cannot experience in any other school.

We aspire to continue our responsibility to serve all families in need of a Springer education, **regardless of socio-economic status**.

### CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION

This new building addition facilitates increasing classroom space, a student arts and multi-purpose auditorium, science and technology labs, community-focused tutorial spaces, and razes Reuben Hall with expanded parking.

Offices will be relocated to the new facility, allowing for expanded student space in the primary building. A newly designed STEAM Lab and Outdoor Learning Lab offer our students the opportunity to explore STEAM and ignite passion.

Tutorial Rooms will allow the Center to expand services and reach more students outside of our day-school.

The outdated Reuben Hall will be razed and additionally needed parking will be added.



The new building will be environmentally friendly and construction will focus on diversity contractors and sub-contractors.





#### Springer's Center builds learning potential - one student, one parent, one educator at a time.

The new auditorium will allow nationally-recognized experts to present their research on learning disabilities. Dyslexia, ADHD, executive functioning, and other topics consistent with our mission to our region. Over the past five years Springer's Center programs have directly impacted more than four thousand parents, professionals, and students in our region.

**Expand Community Partnerships and Programming and Outreach:** Increasing the knowledge about learning disabilities to parents, professionals, and students in the tri-state area. **Increased Expertise:** Provide training for the Wilson Reading Model.

**Establishing tutorial programs** for Springer Alumni and community students with learning disabilities.

**Funding a second psychologist,** due to high demand, in order to continue serving the community in need of psychoeducational expertise.

In fact, my family has always been there for me no matter what and have supported me through life with a learning disability. Last but certainly not least, I'd like to thank my grandpa who was my best friend, look grandpa, I did it, I'm graduating! We believe that all students with learning disabilities have the ability to succeed educationally, socially, and personally, and to ultimately become responsible for their own learning.

The key resources critical for this development include leadership with vision; a highly professional, knowledgeable staff with caring hearts; and a robust, research-based comprehensive program that is developmentally appropriate for each child. Objective testing and demonstrated capacity to self-manage are used to track the students' progress.

#### OUR HISTORY

Springer was established as an independent school in 1971, and Springer's history dates back to 1887 when it was founded as the Cathedral School for the Archdiocese. Reuben Runyan Springer, a noted Cincinnati philanthropist, donated the funds to create the school. From the beginning, it served children with special needs as the original school had a program for the deaf and hard of hearing children. In 1968, based upon a community needs assessment conducted by the University of Cincinnati, Springer became a school for children with learning disabilities. Springer continued as an archdiocesan school until 1971 at which time it became an independent elementary school for children with learning disabilities.

Having relocated several times, Springer moved to its present 6-acre campus at 2121 Madison Road in 1981. Since 1992, Springer has been accredited through the Independent Schools Association of the Central States. The center, opened in January 1999, provides information, referral services, and programs for students, teachers, and parents.
