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#### **Explore, Engage, and Empower** These are the key ideas behind the new class which has become

These are the key ideas behind the new class which has become a favorite among students this fall. To prepare students for their future academics and to support the development of life-long critical thinking skills, Springer has incorporated a STEAM class into Lower School Blue and Gray (grades 4-5) academic schedules.

At this age students are ready to use their science and engineering minds to tackle questions posed in content areas. STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) is the avenue for this to occur intentionally, so that students can be thoughtfully guided through their challenges and encouraged by their successes. With STEAM, students are using their hands in a way that hasn't always been a priority in academic settings. Curriculum Director Dr. Diane Houghton explains, "They are building coordination using their hands and brains to put structures together--they're always collaborating and testing to see function ability." Coupled with the physical pieces of the projects are the planning and design processes, determining what comes first, then next. STEAM teacher Kelly Gallant explains that through their projects, the students are "learning by discovery" rather than being told exactly what to do.

Finding time in the school day for this new offering resulted from looking with a new eye toward whether the time was being utilized most efficiently already. While Technology class had long been part of students' weekly afternoon rotations, those lessons became integrated in other content areas for more organic, meaningful applications. For example, students learned PowerPoint-style presentations in their literature class es to prepare for a presentation already required for that class.

In this way, students learn technology that immediately applies to academic content, which means there is never a time that learning becomes disconnected. After building STEAM skills in the Lower School, students will continue to use thier skills in Middle School, where content areas will include more advanced opportunities with 3-D printing and other new technologies.

Another addition to the 2021-22 curriculum is showing marked growth in students. Eagles READ (Read, Enjoy, and Discover) is a daily schoolwide moment lasting 20 minutes during which each individual at Springer reads a self-selected book. Even staff have taken this charge to stop everything and read. Why is this so significant? It has long been known that daily reading is necessary for progression, but in most settings reading is assigned as homework. For parents of children who struggle with reading, making a child read in the evenings is easier said than done. Many did not read, struggled, or ended up having a parent read to them as an alternative. The Wilson Reading System has been successfully used at Springer for 3 years, but even though proficient reading is achieved, it is common for readers who have struggled in the past to lack a passion for reading. Eagles READ was developed in hopes of gifting that passion back to these students.

A key part of the success of Eagles READ is a result of behind-thescenes preparation work of collecting each of the more than 4,000 books on campus, assessing, and labeling them with an accurate reading level. Because all Springer students are assessed frequently, books with the ideal combination of appropriate reading level and high-interest subject matter may be selected for reading time.

While it is not surprising that the program has nurtured growth, what has been a pleasant finding is how much the students and staff are genuinely enjoying this time each day. Dr. Houghton and the faculty are thrilled at the enthusiasm they've seen in students, noting "There are students who had never finished a book before, who have finished and are asking for another," and "They're looking forward to the next book in a series." One Lower School student shared, "Eagles READ is the best!"



## Lynwood Battle Remembered

This fall, Springer joined with all of Cincinnati to mourn the loss of Lynwood L. Battle, Jr., who lived a life of service and leadership until his passing on August 29. To Springer, he was a beloved alumni grandfather, dedicated board member, and partner in our mission to help children succeed.


Lynwood joined the Board of Trustees in 2014, after his granddaughter Bella enrolled in the Lower School. He was a tremendous asset as a leader, bringing with him a wide breadth of service and leadership experience ranging from his early service in the U.S. Army in the Panama Canal Zone and Vietnam, to his 28 years as Manager of Diversity at Proctor & Gamble, to serving on the boards of the Cincinnati Zoo and Cincinnati Public Schools to name just a few. In his passing, he was honored in Cincinnati with the renaming of Rockdale Avenue in Avondale as Lynwood L. Battle, Jr. Place.

In addition to his well-earned accolades, his achievements are underscored by the integrity and values by which he lived. Former Executive Director Shelly Weisbacher recalls, "I had tried to get him to join the board years before his granddaughter enrolled." He declined so that he could dedicate his time to tending to his wife in the time of her declining health. "It was precisely because of this, the type of person he was, that I wanted him on our board even more."

Lynwood served on the Springer School and Center Board of Trustees from 2014 until his passing, serving on the Resource Committee and in the role of Board Secretary. Staff and faculty were acquainted with Mr. Battle through his involvement in his granddaughter's education, as well as his interest in being an active participant in the diversity and equity initiatives of the organization. Executive Director Brett Marcoux shares, "Lynwood offered valuable insight into every conversation. His wisdom was a gift to us all."

He applied his insight and experience ceaselessly toward the service of his community, and for his leadership and fellowship here at Springer, we are thoroughly grateful. He made a point of getting to know people and letting them know how much he appreciated them.

#### STUDENT COLLECTION IS LARGEST OF THE YEAR

Contributory activities are woven into the fabric of student life at Springer. This year students and advisors selected Sweet Cheeks Diaper Bank as the focus of their charitable efforts.

At an all-school assembly students learned from Sweet Cheeks representatives what diaper need is and why it is of pressing concern for families. They showed a keen interest and sympathy for the difficulties caused by lack of clean diapers. Springer students took this call to action very seriously and set a goal to accumulate 8,000 diapers before their Winter Break. Student Council led the initiative and on December 17th revealed a 24-foot wall of diapers constructed with a goal-busting 11,912 diapers! Sweet Cheeks Founder Meghan Fischer accepted the donation and told students, "This is one of the largest collections received all year, and the largest collection from a school this year."

# Musician In Residence Program in its 25th year

In a melodious quarter-century, the Norita Aplin Musician in Residence Program has acquainted students with a wide range of musical styles and instruments and has become a staple of student life.

Because of generous supporters, the residency has been hosted every year since 1997. This has become a beloved tradition and rite of passage of sorts for the fifth graders who apply and are invited to study in small groups with the musician.

For its silver anniversary, Springer was very pleased to bring back the musician who led the program during its inaugural year, Dr. Chris Tanner. Dr. Tanner is the founder and director of Miami University Oxford's Steel Band, and founded the National Society of Steel Band Educators, a non-profit dedicated to advancing steel band education in the United States.

At Springer, Tanner met with all students during their weekly music classes, introducing them to the history, physiology, and of course the sounds of the steel drums. They learned that steel drums in fact are not drums at all but are steel pans, as they are called in their country of origin, Trinidad. As a college professor he states working with the younger students at Springer is rejuvenating, adding, "It's always a fresh experience."

Dr. Tanner has enjoyed his time at Springer and states that he has been here several times in the past 25 years working with different groups of students. While each year is a unique experience, "What hasn't changed is the mission of the school." Dr. Tanner added, "All employees are focused on and aligned with the mission. That's impressive."

Fifth graders learned holiday-themed arrangements on the steel pans and memorized their parts within a week's time to be prepared for the ensemble performance. All staff and students as well as family members were in attendance for performance on December 17th, which concluded with a sing-along medley of holiday favorites.

## Faculty Always Learning

One of Springer's core values is Staff Expertise and Development, which is key to providing research-based education to our students as well as supporting whole-child development. Two esteemed professionals have presented remarkable programs already this year.

A longstanding commitment to equity and multiculturism continues to be a theme in Springer-sponsored professional development offerings to staff and faculty. On November 8th, all staff participated in a moderated conversation with Dr. Beverly Daniel Tatum on the topic of racial identity development in children. Dr. Tatum is President Emerita of Spelman College and in 2014 received the Award for Outstanding Lifetime Contribution to Psychology, by the American Psychological Association. The focus of her discussion surrounded her National Bestselling book *Why are all the Black Kids Sitting Together in the Cafeteria? And Other Conversations About Race.* All staff and faculty were gifted a book ahead of the program and met in groups to discuss questions for the author. Teachers were able to reflect on their experiences and to view them through the lens of identity-forming stages in children and adolescents. Professional development opportunities like this one provide time for faculty and staff to learn about one another and share their experiences to gain meaningful insights.

Another fall program focused on Sketchnoting, a technique developed by Tanny McGregor, local educator and author of several books including *Ink and Ideas* and *Comprehension Connections*. Sketchnoting is founded on the premise that information that is stored as both image and words strengthens memory. Sketchnoting is a way for students to record their thoughts about source texts, and to use it as an aid for retelling. All of Springer's classroom teachers are taught how to sketchnote and to teach this method to become a strategy for learning. This kind of note taking helps students to summarize and retell, which is also an important component of the Wilson Reading program. Tanny McGregor visited the campus in person to present her training to teachers and instructional assistants.

## Center Expands Outreach

Programming by Springer's Center continues to reach those in need of guidance and LD services in the region. This fall, in a first for Springer, actress, YouTube host, and ADHD expert Jessica Mc-Cabe served as one of two distinguished speakers presented in the annual Distinguished Speakers Series.

As the pandemic continued to prompt caution around large gatherings, the second speaker in the series, Dr. Andrew Johnson presented in an interactive online format as well. Online access to his program will be available via Springer's website this spring.

More than 35 registrants signed up for the online presentation of a Book Club for parents and caregivers on the topic of dyslexia held in January. The benefit of consuming the material at one's convenience is an added draw for some, while in-person sessions are still a preference for many others. The Center continues to plan in-person events when possible, while also advancing the quality of online offerings to expand reach.

Recorded webinars continue to be available online at Springer-LD.org/ center-webinars. Topics range from ADHD and LD understanding for parents and caregivers, to strategic teaching for educators, and a selection of recordings from previous Distinguished Speaker Series events.


#### Power of the Pen

When the Cincinnati Bengals outscored the Kansas City Chiefs to become Champions of the AFC North, the entire region celebrated and quickly began plans for watching the big game.

Announcements online revealed that a number of schools would close for the "holiday" the day following the Super Bowl. However, the original 2021-22 Springer calendar indicated that school would be in session. It wasn't very long before Executive Director Brett Marcoux began receiving formal correspondence from the students regarding the matter.

Lower School Teacher Shelby Chamberlin explains, "Our first trimester writing unit was opinion writing, followed by 'present your opinion' and then letter writing. The students used the skills they learned throughout the school year to develop their letters. They had also learned about the power of language through *The Mind That's Mine* and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in our Black History Month curriculum. The students gathered that MLK made a difference with his voice and his opinion, and they connected that another type of expressive language was writing so they chose to write letters expressing their opinion to Mr. Marcoux!"

Middle School Literature Teacher Emily Kimble was approached on the morning after the big win by a student who was disgruntled Springer had not yet cancelled. She brainstormed with him ways he might "catch more flies with honey" and he developed the idea of writing a letter. "I thought



that was the end of the conversation, but he came to me in sixth bell with a letter in paragraph form." Mrs. Kimble and another faculty member worked with him to edit the letter and it was delivered to Mr. Marcoux who described it as "very compelling." When a student takes lessons from the classroom and applies them meaningfully it is very rewarding. Mrs. Kimble reflects, "I am thrilled for my students to know that their words can make a difference."

Mr. Marcoux addressed parents in an email, urging, "Please be proud of your children for their eloquent writing and appropriate expressions of self-advocacy." Students were thrilled to learn that school was ultimately cancelled on Monday, February 14, 2022.

## Prolific Author Shares Storytelling Secrets

In February, students were introduced to a local author who has been published more than 500 times and has written near double that in her lifetime so far.

Dandi Daley Mackall currently lives near Cleveland, Ohio, but she took students back in time by describing parts of her modest upbringing in a small Missouri town where bareback horse riding, baseball, and storytelling provided elements that developed into a love of writing and set her on the path to becoming an author. She also shared that handwriting was difficult for her—she frequently wrote letters backwards, but she found her way around her struggles by telling stories instead.

Lower School students met with Mackall in small groups throughout the

day to learn tips to improve their own storytelling. She sparked their creativity by challenging them to reflect on "frozen moments" in life, times that one recalls an event in such detail that it seems frozen in time. She also challenged them to practice ways of expressing emotion through description and action rather than telling. Marian, a fourth grader, shared that her class recently wrote a story using frozen moments like those used by the author.

One of the most compelling parts of the day was hearing the true story of how Dandi "Dan" Mackall, used her boyish nickname and skills to write her way into becoming bat boy for the Kansas City A's—well, almost. Being a girl in the years before Title IX presented heartache for Mackall and as she tells it, "Sometimes failing at something turns you on to something *(Continues on next page)* 

#### STUDENTS EARN PRESTIGIOUS AWARDS FOR WRITING

It was announced in January that three Springer Middle School students earned Regional Awards from the Alliance for Young Artists & Writers. Since 1923, the Alliance has been awarding student work based on originality, technical skill, and emergence of a personal voice or vision. Our Springer Eagles are in impressive company as recipients, which include famous names like Director and Producer Ken Burns, Actress and Director Lena Dunham, and Poet Amanda Gorman, who have all been honored during the contest's near century-long history.

Seventh grader Sloane Lipson earned a Silver Key for her suspensful and surreal short story "Shadows", in which the reader follows the mind-twisting experience Elliot finds herself contending with. Eighth grader Seth Goecke won an Honorable Mention in the Science Fiction & Fantasy category for "A Trifling", a story full of intrigue in a familiar yet mysterious setting his character must escape. Seventh grader Esme Chacon's emotional short story "Running to the Light" also earned an Honorable Mention. Her narrative elicits sympathy and causes reflection on one's own values.

you really ought to do." The incredible story is captured in her children's book *A Girl Named Dan*.

In addition to telling her own stories, Mackall built an original story in real time with Middle School students. They started with developing a character, inspiring the reader to empathize with the character, and then "making the character's life miserable" through challenges and problems to form the plot until the character has an epiphany that changes them. Her fun and easy to understand story structure makes writing more accessible and less intimidating for the student to create their own.

Students were able to ask her many questions about being an author. Mackall poignantly answered one Middle Schooler's question "What motivated you to write?" explaining she believes "people want to hear stories," and adding that writing can help you cope with life's difficulties by "helping when tough things are in your head."

Library/Media Specialist Amanda Lim believes "We will see lots of new ideas coming from the students" as a result of the time they have shared together. Mackall is the author of a wide-ranging breadth of fascinating books for children, young adults, and adults on many topics. She has won several awards including the Helen Keating Ott Award and the Edgar Award. After hearing some of the compelling origins behind her books, many students and staff are already adding her titles to their reading lists. Her books are available on dandibooks.com.

## **Fifty Year Anniversary**

Springer School and Center is celebrating fifty years! Although the very start of Springer in its earliest form dates back to 1884, Springer as the independent school dedicated to serving students with learning disabilites began with the 1971-72 school year.

Commemoration of the anniversary launched at the start of the 2021-22 school year, with a special 50-Year Challenge posed each month. We have challenged each other to walk or run for fittness to start the school year in a healthy way. October's challenge emphasized LD/ADHD Awareness month as our social media accounts posed questions and facts to increase knowledge.

November's challenge took a particularly meaningful tone, inviting all students, staff, and families to write a short word or sentence to compile "Fifty things we LOVE about Springer." The challenge was received with more enthusiasm than any prior. More than 200 statements were handwritten with colorful glass-writing markers in the window wall opposite the gym. Staff wrote their own statements and were especially touched by the carefully written words of the children. Some wrote they liked PE class, or to read, or even that they

liked having friends. Landon, a Lower School student, wrote "I like Springer because it helps me read and write." Another student wrote "never feeling left out." Several young artists drew pictures to illustrate their words. With a grateful tenor, another wrote "Springer is a home away from home."

The event, which is co-chaired by Peter Frey and Carrie and Rob Gould, will also include our favorite activities: an amazing auction and delicious fare, as well as an exciting look at the years ahead of us. To be held in person at the Cincinnati Music Hall Ballroom, this will be the party of a semi century!


